1. How did you choose your topic and how does it relate to the annual theme?

2. How did you conduct your research?

Gale and Context Middle School was helpful and so was American History, although much of my information and images came from websites, including [cia.gov](http://cia.gov), and Navajo Nation. All of my sources that I used were helpful in giving me facts and images for my project. I kept track of all this information by entering my sources into Noodletools for quick access when I needed resources for my project.

3. How did you create your project?

The reason that I chose to do a website for my project is because of the higher total word limit. The Navajo Code Talkers communicated with each other in their native tongue, and that gave America a strategic advantage over its enemies, allowing multiple victories and delivering the only uncracked code in military history.

5. In what ways is your topic significant in history?

The Navajo Code Talkers had a major impact in history. The Navajo Code Talkers allowed multiple victories for America and provided a major strategic advantage over Japan, helping the United States win WWII. The Code Talkers also helped America when they served in the Korean War, and at the start of the Vietnam War.
