Little Johnny Sugita, age 12, once a care-free, fun-loving boy filled with mischief, as is typical of boys everywhere lay critically ill, his life a mere shadow of what it was formerly, as a result of a ruptured appendicitis with the setting in of blood poisoning. As a pendulum sways, so was his life swaying -- be-tween life and death:

But perhaps that distance was too far to reach, for penicillin is reserved for the armed forces and is not on the market for civilian use. Through the painstaking efforts of Dr. A. Pressman, penicillin was promised to save little Johnny's life, by the Re-gional Army Hospital on Davis Lt. in Tucson, Ariz, after first contacting the Denver Medical Denot, where Poston's medical supplies are obtained.

TODAY:

Within 24 hours, the penicillin arrived, but it was not used for little Johnny. As the saying goes "Where there's a will, there's a way," and Johnny's will to live had won out. In the face of death, Johnny had made one last stand and had won out, on "old man" death. Defeated, death had faded out of the picture and in his stead stood "lady" hope with all her banners waving

TOLORROW:


