Forefathers' Asks Legion Adjutant

Flag Presentations To Local Schools

"To keep this nation strong we must return to the faith of our torefathers, reaffirm our moral code and dedicate ourselves to the service of our nation and our fellowmen," Charles L. Kessler, adjutant of the Virginia Division American Legion, told an audience at the closing session of "I Am An American" day on Wednesday

Beginning with 1776, he traced the development of the American nation, praised the constitution, which was an inspired document composed by free men for their own protection. He warned, however, of the growth of central government and cited three invasions of states rights. First, when the thirteen American colonies were oppressed by the misrule of the British government. resulting in the Declaration of Independence, the Revolutionary War, the Constitution of the United States, and the formation of a republic Second, the decision of the Federal Government to compel the Confederate States to remain in the Union, resulting in a strong central government. Third, the decision of the Supreme Court on Monday abolishing segregation in public schools.





State Commission Will Soon Begin Studying Issues

School Superintendent T. J. McIlwaine today said that he expects to start consultations with the Prince Edward county school -oon but that specific decisions by that body on the Supreme Court's segregation decision can unfold only as instructions are received here from the State

Board of Education "In the light of what we know now, based on announcements from state leaders, our schools will probably operate through next year on the present basis. the superintendent said.

"This will provide time to make necessary adjustments," he added, pointing out that many decisions must await the final decrees of the Supreme Court after consultations in Washington next fall on how the court's decision is to be implemented and how soon.

Call for Reason

"Meanwhile our hope is that all of our people will wait quietly until we can find out more specifically how the order is to be carried out. All of us desire earnestly that an atmosphere of calm reasonableness and a spirit of justice prevail here as we seek to work out our problems as directed in the state and national

Edward A. Carter, chairman of the county board of supervisors expressed the view that formation of a Virginia commission to study the problem-as already suggested by Governor Stanley the best approach to the new

He said he sees no reason for a special meeting of the board of supervisors, but that the body as the county's governing group would probably discuss the broad aspects of the question as it may affect Prince Edward county.

"The issue is now before us and if all of us deal reasonably, talk sensibly and act fairly we will work out the problem in fairness to all after the Supreme Court's final decrees are made known next
