# SEGREGATION DECLARED UNCONSTITUTIONAL

Lynchburg Man Given Thirty-Five Years For Rape

### **High Court** Decrees It **Must Cease**

Washington-The Supreme Court this week unanimously struck down segregation in the nation's public schools. The tribunal said that to separate Negro and white pupils violates the constitutional guarantee of equal protection of the laws.

The court said it will hear arguments in the fall on how and when to end the practice.

Chief Justice Warren read the court's opinion which declared:

"We conclude that in the field of public education the doctrine of separate but equal has no place. Separate educational facilities are inherently unequal.

"Therefore, we hold that the plaintiffs (Negro parents) and other similarly situated for whom the action has been brought are, by reason of the segregation complained of, deprived of the equal protection of the laws guaranteed by the 14th Amendment.

"This disposition makes unnecessary any discussion noke. The appointees were whether such segregation also violates the due process clause of the 14th Amendment."

The 14th Amendment was adopted after the Civil War, primarily for the benefit of slaves freed by President Lincoln. It says no state may deny any person due process and equal protection of the law, nor abridge their privileges or immunities.

LYNCHBURG, Va.-Bernard Skipper, 21, has been sentenced to a 35-year prison term after a Corporation Court trial from which the press and the public were barred during the presentation of evidence.

Skipper, a young Lynchburg Negro, was accused of Emeritus Assistant Chief of program of public relation- was also closed to the press and public, the defendant raping a white woman a year ago. In that hearing, which was given 30 years.

The verdict of that first trial was appealed by Attorney Harold B. Singleton, who was appointed by the court to defend Skipper. The State Supreme Court ordered a new trial.

At the opening of the second trial, Commonwealth's Attorney Royston Jester, III, made a motion to close the court in view of the nature of the charges and the evidence which was to be anticipated. Judge S. DuVal Martin asked defense attorney Singleton if he objected. He agreed to the motion after saying that he had maturely considered the matter and felt that it was to the best interest of the prisoner. Judge Martin then sustained the motion of attorney Jester and directed City Sergeant Charles M. Watts to carry it out. As in the first trial the court was opened, following the conclusion of the evi-
