Process Paper

I chose this topic because I would like to become a marine biologist in the future. Over months, I narrowed my project down from "Human relations with the ocean" to just the Trieste dive.

I conducted my research by collecting 15 or so sources over summer break, and out of those, I chose around 7. I had two interviews, Bill Steever and David Barker, and used secondary sources backed up with a primary source. I also used some articles from a few websites as secondary sources.

I created the website by using a "website organization" packet given to us by our coach to organize and brainstorm ideas for the website. I then collected a few pictures and quotes to illustrate the website. The hardest part was condensing the information within the word limit.

My historical argument is that reaching Challenger deep was both a technological feat and a human achievement, at the same level as space exploration. Both allowed humanity to discover new frontiers in the name of exploration. None of them would have been possible without international collaboration. Also, the bravery of Piccard and Walsh was crucial to this mission. Even with all the problems they faced, they still had the faith and determination to push on until they broke through one of the illusive boundaries for humanity. Judging by my research, the dive of the Trieste was no easier than the Apollo missions, but received much less attention. I think ocean exploration should take the spotlight in terms of public recognition.

My topic is significant because it proved to people that with sound science and bravery, humanity can open frontiers. The *Trieste* was the precursor to many submersibles that were deep sea rescue and exploration, including the *Trieste 2* and the *Alvin*.
