For years women had been trying to gain the same rights as men. The Seneca Falls

Convention of 1848 broke the frontier of women's rights. This was the first ever convention held
to discuss the everlasting issue of women not having nearly as many rights as men ("Seneca Falls

Convention"). The convention majorly impacted the press, as it was laughed at and made fun of
as nobody at that time believed that women should have the same rights as men (*Seneca County Courier*). The Declaration of Sentiments, which was written at the convention, influenced
women's suffrage and was used as a base to build or continue the statements of the Declaration
which were later used to drive women to have the right to vote (Callahan). The importance of the
convention is the Declaration of Sentiments and that the convention helped women gain the right
to vote ("Seneca Falls Convention").

Women's suffrage has always been a topic I have been interested in. It is a topic that I've wondered about for quite some time. When I was researching topics to choose, I, at first, was thinking about doing the Nineteenth Amendment, but as I was researching that I came across the Seneca Falls Convention. I was shocked that I had never heard about this before considering it was a pretty important event in the history of women's suffrage. As I started researching the Convention I realized that this was what I wanted to write about because there didn't seem to be much public light shed on the Convention. I chose to do the Seneca Falls Convention to spread the word about the importance of the Convention and have people understand why this Convention is such an important piece in the women's suffrage movement.

I started my research by searching for primary sources that would cover the topics that I needed to hit, by standards. I was searching for sources that could cover as many key points as possible in one, a task that proved harder than it seemed. Eventually, I found two primary sources that worked for me. The secondary sources were found very easily, as I had struck gold
