How did we choose our topic?

We became interested in our topic, William C. Menninger, because we live in the Topeka area, and wanted to know more about our hometown history. We have grown up hearing about the Menninger Clinic as we pass it on the highway, but never knew what lay within. William C. Menninger, a founder of the Menninger Clinic, broke barriers by studying the effects of war on the human psyche, making psychiatry understandable for the layman, and advancing mental healthcare. The clinic has been closed in Topeka since 2000, meaning we never saw it functioning. The mystery behind the bell tower and what happened at the famous Menninger clinic and Sanitarium intrigued us to choose the topic.

How did we conduct our research?

Our research began by understanding the general idea of who the Menningers were and their contributions to medicine. Once we found our background knowledge we went to Washburn University to use their library and online databases to find the essential sources needed to further understand the impact of William C. Menninger in the field of psychiatry. We found JSTOR to be helpful in finding other sources. Additionally, we spent many hours at the Kansas Archives at the Kansas Museum of History, searching through their materials. We added nearly thirty primary sources directly from the original clinic. Along with as several articles that were published during the prime groundbreaking years of success. Furthermore, we utilized the sources found on Kansas Memory to enhance our digital finding.

Why did we choose our category and how did we create our project?
